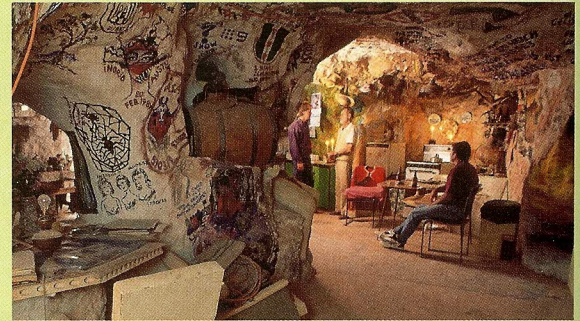


Around the world: Homes with a difference
